

New Projects Could Bring \$100 Million in New Investment to City

New residential projects currently in the design and approval process could potentially bring close to \$100 million in new investment and close to 600 new residential units to the City of Clayton over the next 5-10 years.

The communities, which include diverse housing styles including attached single-family units targeting empty nesters and retirees, detached single family houses for families and apartment units for young professionals, could all break ground in 2022.

Grand Traditions is a two-time "builder of the year" award winner who specialize in custom homes including single family and town home housing styles. Their Grand Villas of Clayton will be an attached single-family style of housing product targeting empty nesters and seniors who are looking to downsize and crave a low maintenance style of living. Their final development plan was approved by City Council in July. Grand Villas will be located to the southern portion of the Village of North Clayton community and will access from Hoke Rd. It will include attached garages, ponds and an activity center for its residents. Grand Traditions is hoping to break ground

on the first phase of the 128-unit community in late 2021/early 2022 and hope to be moving new residents in by the end of 2022.

DDC LLC is part of a local residential development team who has over 30 years of experience building an assortment of housing communities including several in the Washington Twp. and Springboro areas. They received preliminary approval for their 33-acre, single-family home project, located at the northwest corner of Union and Westbrook, in July as well. Hunter's Path, which will target young families looking to come to the Northmont community, will include 125 houses and include sidewalks, streetlights, three ponds with fountains, a centralized community park, open green space throughout and a multi-use path on the exterior of the community site. DDC is hoping to submit final plans for consideration by the end of 2021 and breaking ground in 2022 with units coming online by the beginning of 2023.

Windsor Companies, who has garnered great reviews on their redevelopment of over 1 million square feet of commercial and residential real estate in downtown Dayton, including the Fire Blocks District, has taken over the majority ownership of the Village of North Clayton on National Road. Windsor is currently working with city staff on getting their plans ready for submittal to move forward their vision of what the finished Village of North Clayton community will look like, including a complete build out of the single-family estate homes and new modern and market rate apartments and townhomes consistent with what was originally planned in the community over 15 years ago. Windsor Companies is also engaged with Justin Doyle Homes to spearhead the build out of the single-family portion of the development. Justin Doyle Homes hopes to be breaking ground by the end of 2021 with at least one model home in the area. ☀️

The Autumn months are here! Earlier sunsets, cooler evenings, changing foliage, and the familiar sights and sounds of school busses usher out Summer and welcome the Fall season. Please make it a point to get outside, get some fresh air, and enjoy all the amenities our region has to offer.

The City of Clayton continues to evolve. Your city staff continues to work every day to make your hometown the very best it can be. I can't possibly list everything they are working on, but here are a few notables

- 2 new housing developments are planned, the first at the intersection of Union and Westbrook Roads, and the second near Hoke and National Roads to the rear of the Village of North Clayton. Additional housing will attract new business. Look for both to break ground in 2022.
- Our Clayton Police officers are now equipped with body cameras. This high-tech equipment will help our officers work more effectively and efficiently, make the job safer, and enhance communication. They are in use now.
- Meadowbrook at Clayton had its best year since we acquired it. The golf course recovered from the tornado damage and is in great shape. The clubhouse had new entry doors installed, some air conditioning units replaced, and is in process of getting the AV system upgraded. Events can be scheduled for both the clubhouse and the golf course.
- The intersection of Westbrook and St Rt 49 is scheduled to be reconfigured. The current outdated design will get a much-needed face lift in 2022.
- The Clayton Government Academy is currently under way. This class is offered annually to citizens who wish to better understand their local government. The class will learn about each department, the responsibilities, the equipment, and the leadership.
- The Clayton Police Department has again contracted with Northmont City Schools to provide Resource Officers at the high school, middle school, and Northwood Elementary.
- Our Labor Day Fireworks show was excellent. Thanks to the Parks Advisory Commission, city staff, and City Council for the planning and hands-on work required to manage the event.



- Phase 1 of the Hoke Road improvement is in the beginning stages. This phase will widen Hoke from Smith Dr. (Wal-Mart) to Wenger Rd. The Ohio Department of Transportation, and the Miami Valley Regional Planning Commission are both working with Clayton on this project. It will include water and sewer services, a multi-use path, improvement to the Wenger/Hoke intersection, and turn lanes. This is a multi-year project.
- Our Fire Department Collaboration with the cities of Union and Englewood continue to prove to be an excellent strategic decision. All three departments have saved money and resources by working together. The calls are answered more efficiently, and response times are down.

I encourage all residents to take an active interest in our city. We have many opportunities to get involved. Planning Commission, Parks Advisory Commission, Charter Review Committee, Board of Zoning Appeals are just a few to mention. Our Council meetings are open to the public. And, of course, you can always call or email any of us directly.

Finally, I want to recognize the fine citizens and business owners of Clayton. These are the people that make our city a great place to live. Thanks for your continued support of our city.

COVID Relief Funds Assisting City

The American Rescue Plan (ARP), the \$1.9 trillion stimulus package passed by Congress and signed by President Biden, has a \$4.6 billion Coronavirus Local Fiscal Recovery Fund Provision which will be distributed to local governments, including the City of Clayton slated to receive approximately \$1,385,018.

The money distributed will be considered a grant with smaller cities like Clayton receiving payment through the state. At the May 20, 2021 Clayton City Council meeting, City Council approved the creation of the American Rescue Plan Fund, allowing staff to better track the money spent.

The money will be distributed by the state in two payments: the first payment in 2021 and the other 50% 12 months later. The money must be spent by December 31, 2024.

The program guidance provided to the states detail the funds can be used to: Respond to health emergencies or the negative impacts of COVID on the community; provide premium pay to front line workers in the organization; revenue replacement; and/or to make necessary improvements to water, sewer, or broad band infrastructure.

The guidance also states that municipalities must provide updates to the Treasury Department similar to reporting when FEMA money is utilized.

At the June 17, 2021 Council meeting staff discussed with Council the proposed projects for the first tranche of money. Staff tried to leverage grant funding with the ARP Funds to get the best value for the City. Six focus areas were established that together create the foundation for the Clayton Recovery Plan. Departments were responsible for submitting potential projects, designing & executing the project plans, and eventually managing of the project delivery & reporting.

The six focus areas were as follows:
Neighborhoods: Projects and investments that reduce blight, improve the physical appearance, and increase the quality-of-life experience of residents in the neighborhood;
Community Recovery: Projects and investments in recovery areas including those ravaged by the Memorial Day tornadoes, as well as areas of severe disinvestment. Also included are funding for projects and investments that promote the value of diversity, equity, and inclusion in the City of Clayton; Amenities

Projects and investments that provide recreational and lifestyle assets to the community including playgrounds and parks; Major Catalytic Projects: Projects and investments that incent additional development, economic activity, and quality of life improvements; City Projects: Projects and investments that improve City Service delivery, reduce future operating/legacy costs, and promote sustainable environmental practices; External Awards: Funding to support vulnerable economic sectors that might otherwise not survive the pandemic.

- Parking Lot Mill and Fill (Resurfacing) Project at Clayton Park at Hardscrabble

- ADA Compliant Restrooms Project at Westbrook Park
- HVAC System Replacement at Meadowbrook at Clayton
- The payment of a single audit for the federal funds. ☀️

PLAN Clayton Implementation Committee Summary of Committee Work

The PLAN Clayton Implementation Committee (PCIC), which was formed by City Council Resolution #R-11-20-56, on November 5, 2020, began its work in January 2021 and finished meetings in June 2021.

In total the Committee had seven meetings as a full committee and numerous sub-committee meetings in between. The objective of the PCIC was to identify projects or initiatives that the city could undertake to set the table for future development in the City of Clayton and to build an identifiable brand for the city through community amenities, signage and physical infrastructure elements that are unmistakably Clayton.

The PCIC presented its final report to City Council on July 15, 2021. The report provides a list of projects that were identified by the Committee around PLAN Clayton's four primary goals, including (1) Walkable Neighborhoods, (2) Central Cores (areas of public gathering), (3) Connected Parks, and (4) Great Streets & Infrastructure. The list includes projects that run the range from planning initiatives to major improvement projects. Zoning Code Update:

- City Council allocated the funds to hire a professional consultant to undertake the complete rewrite of the Clayton Zoning Code at the end of 2018. Staff worked with the Council selected zoning consultant for two years preparing the final draft of the new code early in 2021.
- The new zoning code compliments the PLAN Clayton document, which was previously approved unanimously by City Council in 2018. A Steering Committee made up of city residents, building officials, MVRPC staff, city zoning and planning board reps and city staff worked with consultant over the past two years. There were also two workshops, open to the public, with City Council to discuss the project and to receive feedback from Council before the final draft was completed.
- Planning Commission voted unanimously in April to recommend approval.
- City Council voted unanimously in June to approve the new zoning code.
- New zoning code became law on July 17.

Leaf Pick-Up

It's that time of year again when the leaves begin to fall, and yards transition from the bright colors of summer to beautiful hues of autumn. To help residents remove fallen leaves, Clayton will continue offering two scheduled pickups starting at the end of October through the end of November. Crews will also make additional tours through neighborhoods during the leaf pickup program and one time afterwards to ensure all the leaves taken out to the road during the program are removed prior to the snow removal season. The leaf pickup season will start on October 25th this year. Please see the chart to find out when your street's scheduled pickups will be.

To assist in making the leaf collection process run as smoothly as possible residents are asked to remember the following tips:

- Place only leaves in the leaf piles. Other forms of yard waste such as rocks, pieces of cement, tree branches, twigs, flowers, walnuts, and grass clippings slow the collection process and damage City equipment.
- Have leaves in place on the Sunday preceding the scheduled week of your zone collection.
- If there are leaves left after the pickup, it is because crews could not reach them with the equipment. Residents will need to move them closer to the street and they'll be picked up on the next pass.
- Residents may place leaves and yard waste at the curb in standard plastic bags for normal trash pickup at any time.



Upcoming Community Events Planned for City

After a year of cancelled and altered community events due to the COVID pandemic, Clayton has returned to a normal slate of community events throughout this year. Starting with the Easter Egg Hunt this spring and followed by Spring Sweep Clayton Clean, the summer's document shredding event and then Movie in the Park and the Labor Day Festival and Fireworks in late summer, community events have continued to be offered throughout 2021 with great community turnouts. Heading into the fall and winter months, Clayton will continue to offer outreach events for the entire community and Clayton families while following local public health requirements.

Clayton Successfully Completes Several Road Improvement Projects in 2021

Heading into 2021 the Clayton Service Department had a full schedule of public infrastructure improvements throughout the entire Clayton community. This year's road construction program began in the beginning of the summer with the curb replacement project on Westbrook Road between Taywood and Garber Roads. This project was in anticipation of the Westbrook resurfacing project being funded by a grant in 2022. That specific project will see Westbrook fully resurfaced, from Salem Avenue to Cheri Lynne as part of a Miami Valley Regional Planning Commission's (MVRPC) Surface Transportation Program (STP) resurfacing grant. Curb replacement and paving was also completed on Old Salem, Artistic, Caldero and Willowcreek Roads this summer.

Following up on the massive concrete and catch basin replacement project along SR 49 in 2020, all of Salem Avenue from Westbrook to Southway Road in Clayton was also resurfaced during the warmer months of 2021.

Coinciding with the other infrastructure improvement projects this summer, Clayton is undertaking its second safety project this fall, this time at the intersection at Union Road and Salem Avenue. This intersection will see the extension of the southbound turn lane of Union Road and upgrade all the signals at this intersection with mast arms. The intersection of Westbrook and Salem Avenue will see the third safety project undertaken in 2022. Both of these safety projects are being funded via the Ohio Department of Transportation. ☀️

Body Cameras Help Keep Clayton Safe

At the end of August, Clayton Mayor Mike Stevens, City Manager Amanda Zimmerlin and Chief of Police Matt Hamlin introduced Clayton Police Department's new body camera system to the public at a news conference held at the Clayton Government Center. The announcement followed Clayton City Council's earlier approval of the \$130,000 contract with Utility BodyWorn Cameras, providing the Clayton Police Department with 17 body cameras over the life of a five-year contract period. This all-inclusive agreement includes all the necessary support technology, data storage, maintenance and repair, technology upgrades, camera upgrades at the three-year mark and software for redaction and reproduction capability.

The new body camera system provides greater transparency and accountability to the public at large as well as to the Clayton Police Department as a whole. The cameras provide audio as well as video footage of officers' interaction with the public every time contact is made. The video system also provides footage which is sharable to the Montgomery County Prosecutor's Office and Vandalia Municipal Court. This state-of-the-art system is one of the most advance technologies available for body cameras, demonstrated by the equipment being CAD activated, GPS based, as well as being able to be manually activated by the officers. The system also has multiple sensors mounted on the officers' holster and vehicles and includes additional features including live streaming capability and an officer down feature in case an officer is knocked down during a struggle, which results in the cameras automatically being activated, and alerting the Regional Dispatch Center and other officers for assistance. This additional step in officer and public safety is another example of why Clayton is continuously rated as the safest city in Montgomery County. ☀️

Income Tax Reporting Clarification

Since 2016 there have been changes to Ohio regulations for income tax payment and filing which has caused a lot of confusion and consternation in our community. These changes were made by the state legislature and not the City of Clayton. These regulations apply to residents across every city in Montgomery County and Ohio.

The biggest change, mandated by the Ohio Legislature and not your local community, is the annual estimate and quarterly payment requirement. The new regulation, which is very confusing, requires a statewide threshold for requiring the remittance of estimated taxes to be \$200 after withholding and credits for taxes paid to other municipalities is considered. If the taxpayer meets the \$200 threshold, the taxpayer shall file a declaration of estimated taxes and make quarterly payment with all payments due by January 15th the following year. These dates are determined and announced by the state of Ohio and will be passed along when Clayton receives them.

We understand this new change is very confusing and we want to help answer any questions you may have. To cut costs of services, Clayton contracts with CCA to collect municipal income taxes. Michelle Jordan is CCA's Administrator for Clayton Income Tax can be reached at 216-857-7382 and will be happy to answer or clarify any questions our residents have with regards to this state mandate. Residents can also call CCA-Division of Taxation at 216-664-2070 or toll free at 800-223-6317. The City of Clayton can also be reached at 937-836-3500.

CCA has set up a schedule of onsite dates so residents can come into Clayton offices and meet with a representative from CCA without an appointment and get assistance on any local income tax questions. The schedule of these dates is below. There will also be additional dates scheduled to assist with income tax filings after the first of the year.

**-Estimated tax payments for fourth quarter 2021 are due by 1/15/22, so this additional January date allows taxpayers to make final payments or get help with establishing their liability and making payment prior to this fourth quarter due date.*

Income Tax Reporting

A quick reminder if you now permanently work from home instead of your employer's office headquarters, it's now required per state law to change your local tax withholdings to Clayton. This simple change will most likely lead to a decrease in your total city taxes paid.
