

In 2021, the City of Clayton established a resident rate for green fees, saving residents \$2.00, thanks to the Fair Share policy. Resident rates apply to those persons living within the corporate limits of the City of Clayton. The resident discount pass is issued upon proof of residency and is good for two-years. So, those who established their residency in 2021, will automatically receive the resident rate in 2022.

Meadowbrook Golf will once again be the home course to the Northmont Bolts men’s and ladies’ JV and Varsity teams for the 2022 season. In June, the Northmont Bolts held their annual Junior Golf Camp at Meadowbrook. “We love being able to offer a new generation of golfer the opportunity to foster their love of the game through the Northmont schools,” states Facility Manager Elaine Wittman.

EVENT FACILITY

In April of this year, event operations at Meadowbrook at Clayton were amended. The city took over day to day operations of the event facility and snack bar. “Permitting outside caterers has given us the ability to host a greater variety of events.” said Event Manager Amanda Fritz. This summer commenced with ten graduation parties in May and June. This is in addition to the multiple wedding ceremonies and receptions, baby showers, anniversary parties, birthday parties, and class reunions hosted. There are still dates available

Summer Greetings Everyone!

I hope you are enjoying the weather, cookouts, family, friends, and baseball! The city is busy working every day to make improvements, attract smart development, and add value to our community. I hope you will agree we are making important strides.

Dirt is being moved! Clayton currently has three residential developments in the initial stages of construction. These developments (Grand Villas of Clayton, Wenger Village, Section 3, and Hunter's Path) will add nearly 300 new residences to our city. This population increase is critical for us if we are to attract quality business and commerce.

Also, we have just started the third of three intersection improvements along St Rt 49. Infrastructure projects at the Hoke and Union intersections is now completed, and the most labor-intensive project of the three, at Westbrook Rd, started in June. Paving, concrete work, signage, lighting, and signals have all been engineered to improve traffic flow and make these busy intersections safer for the entire community at large.

Meadowbrook at Clayton is very busy! The golf course is nearly booked with leagues, tee times, and events. The event facility is hosting a lot of business after being slow through the pandemic years. We adopted a new business plan in 2022 that has allowed for more efficient operations while giving the customer complete control over catering options. We will continue to make adjustments as needed to make your event experience even better.

Parks Continue to be Improved

Over the last few years, the Clayton Service Department has worked in unison with the Clayton Parks Advisory Commission implementing continual park upgrades, per PLAN Clayton, throughout the entire Clayton Park System. With the influx of COVID related resources, paired with earmarked funds specifically budgeted by City Council for additional park improvements, the parks will continue to be bustling with construction work through the end of 2022 and throughout 2023. Below are some of improvements Clayton residents can look forward to seeing over the next 12-18 months:

- Resurfaced parking lots and multi-use paths. Taking advantage of a grant awarded earlier this year, a new ADA compliant parking lot is currently being installed in Northview Park where the former basketball court was located. This will complement the newly widened and resurfaced multi-use path which will be able to be used by everyone in the Northmont community. Clayton Park at Hardscrabble will also have all of the parking lots, including the upper parking lot along W. Salem Street, resurfaced this year, increasing parking opportunities and improving storm water drainage at the park. Westbrook Park is also slated to have its parking lot and walking paths resurfaced by the end of 2022.
- After a resounding positive response on last year's Pickleball Community Survey, Clayton City Council has approved the installation of four new pickleball courts at the former pool area at Meadowbrook at Clayton. These new courts are scheduled to be installed in October of this year with the final painting and striping occurring in the spring of 2023, just in time to open for residents to come out and enjoy the new courts at Meadowbrook in the 2023 spring months.
- Clayton has been notified we will be awarded a \$80,000 CDBG grant from Montgomery County to be paired with COVID related funds to install a new, state-of-the-art all-inclusive playground where the current swing set is located in Northview Park. This playground will include an all-weather rubber surface, sensory boards, adaptive play equipment as well as traditional swings and slides for everyone to enjoy.
- Westbrook Park will be able to use reallocated CDBG funds from Montgomery County to completely upgrade the restroom facilities, which have been closed for years. These planned upgrades are scheduled to start this upcoming winter and will run into the spring of 2023. When finished, the new facilities will be fully ADA compliant.
- Starting this upcoming school year, the City of Clayton and MVCTC will partner together working on new park identification signage at the entrance of every park in Clayton. MVCTC students will build the new foundations of the signs while the Clayton Service Department will take advantage of the new sign making machine creating upgraded sign faces. One new sign will be created per semester over the next couple of school years, assisting Clayton in beautifying park entrances throughout the city. Staff will also begin working on new wayfinding signage throughout the Clayton community to assist residents in finding the locations to the parks.
- Another great educational partnership will occur this fall when Clayton and the Northmont High School Art Club will partner together to upgrade an existing pump building located between the Meadowbrook golf course and parking lot area. Students will create and paint a community mural on the pump house, beautifying the building and creating a neat photo opportunity for the entire Northmont community. 🌞

Projects on the Horizon

In addition to all the current public infrastructure projects, Clayton staff has simultaneously been planning and working on future projects with one of those projects projected to significantly improve transportation in the Clayton and Northmont region. All of these projects are currently in the engineering phases.

- 1) The Salem Street Resurfacing Project is projected to start in 2023. The \$447,335 project is being funded through a \$357,868 MVRPC STP Resurfacing 80/20 grant.
- 2) The Philipsburg-Union Resurfacing Project (from Haber Road to Shaw Road) is projected to begin in 2023. This project is being funded via a MVRPC COVID grant. Clayton is providing a \$200,000 match for this project.
- 3) The Hoke Road Widening Project is a transformational

project which will see Hoke Road not only widened between Smith Drive and Wenger Road but will also have sanitary and water utilities extended south from Wenger Road to Smith Drive. This project is Phase 1 of a two-phase project which will eventually see Hoke Road widened all the way north to National Road. Phase 1, which is slated to begin in 2026, will also include a 10-foot multi-use path on the west side of Hoke, a sidewalk on the east side and a traffic control mechanism at the Hoke/Wenger intersection. Clayton was awarded a \$2.6 million CMAQ grant from MVRPC and the State of Ohio in late 2021 for this project. The city's local match is estimated to be approximately \$1.2 million. Clayton staff is currently working with an engineering consultant and ODOT staff on the preliminary engineering and environmental studies for this project. ☀️

New Residential Projects Break Ground in June

Demonstrating Clayton's continued growth into a destination for developers and builders in Montgomery County, three new residential projects broke ground in early June. Grand Villas of Clayton will begin installing infrastructure for their luxury apartment project on Hoke Rd, in the southern section of Village of North Clayton, which targets seniors, empty nesters and young professionals this summer. Actual unit construction is projected to begin later this year. Grand Traditions, the developer for this project, has set a goal of having units available to move in to by the first or second quarter of 2023. Hunter's Path, located on the northwest corner of Union and Westbrook is following a similar time

frame for their market rate single family community. The first phase of Hunter's Path is currently working on infrastructure installation and will begin actual home construction by the end of 2022. Arbor Homes is the builder for Hunter's Path. Wenger Village, Section 3 began site work in June and will begin extending roads in the existing Wenger Village community later this summer with home construction, by D.R. Horton, commencing soon after. All of these new residential communities are implementing recommended community standards found in PLAN Clayton ensuring Clayton continues to grow in a smart and community friendly manner. These components include sidewalks/walking paths, community green space, centralized parks, streetlights and many more aspects. These three projects combined demonstrate over \$50 million in investment in the City of Clayton. ☀️



Parks Advisory Commission Offers New Programs to the Community

The Clayton Parks Advisory Commission has spent considerable time over the last several years spearheading various park initiatives including adding many new elements called out in PLAN Clayton including new disc golf baskets, new bike racks, new trash cans & animal waste receptacles, new benches, picnic tables & grills as well as volunteering for annual park cleanups & community events such as the Labor Day Fireworks Festival and Breakfast with Santa. The group, made up of City Council appointed Clayton residents, has also supported new and ongoing park improvement projects including restroom upgrades, new bleachers, resurfaced paths, and improved parking lots. After two years' worth of limitations related to the COVID pandemic, the Parks Advisory Commission set out in 2022 to create new outreach programming at Meadowbrook at Clayton appealing to a cross section of the Northmont community. As a result, three new programs will be rolled out in the coming months, each targeting a specific age demographic of the community.

Clayton Uses Grants and In-House Inspections to Conserve Resources While Fixing Infrastructure

If you drive through Clayton this time of year, sometimes it feels as if there are more orange barrels on the road than I-75 South towards Cincinnati. However, these significant improvement projects are being driven by the dedicated Service Department staff who are always looking for ways to save taxpayer resources through grant awards and inhouse inspections. Below is a list of all of the public infrastructure projects being conducted this year with brief summaries.

1) The Union Road and Salem Avenue Intersection Safety Project was completed on May 20th. The \$430,570 project was funded at 100% through the ODOT Safety Grant Program. This safety project upgraded the signals at the intersection and extended the southbound Union turn lane. The new mast arms and advanced radar detection will provide a much safer intersection and provides an example of future branding initiatives the community can expect when new streetlights are installed over the next several years in Clayton. This is a project example where the city saved an additional \$30,000 through our inhouse construction inspection program.

2) The Westbrook Road Paving (from Salem Avenue to Cheri Lynne Drive) was completed on June 15th and was partially funded through a joint MVRPC STP Resurfacing grant award. The cost to the cities of Clayton and Trotwood was \$87,646 respectively, with the remaining \$298,472 covered via the grant. The city also saves \$29,000 for construction inspection by providing that service in house with our specially trained staff.

3) The Westbrook Road and Salem Avenue Intersection Safety Project was started in the second week of June. This project, like the Union/Salem Intersection Project, will provide advanced radar detection with new signals and mast arms. Additionally, the longtime center pork-chop divider will be removed on Westbrook. This project is also being primarily funded through ODOT's Safety Grant Program at an award of \$500,000 with a local match of \$111,500. This project will also eventually save approximately \$30,000 with inhouse inspections.



4) The Old Mill and Rinehart Roads Chip Seal Project is scheduled to be completed by mid-July this year. This project is a part of the city's regularly scheduled and budgeted paving program. The city continues to have great results on these lower traveled roads with a 3-stage chip and seal program. The \$190,000 project starts with a sealing of all the fractured pavement, followed by a $\frac{3}{4}$ inch pavement leveling course and is finally topped with another chip and seal.

5) The regularly scheduled Sweet-Potato Ridge Road Paving Project will occur between July and September of this year. The \$200,000 paving project will see Sweet Potato, between Haber and Diamond Mill, completely resurfaced.

6) The 2022 Curb Replacement and Road Resurfacing Project includes Whispering Meadow Drive, Thundering Herd Place, Colleen Court, Dolores Court, Jackie Circle, Jean Drive, Debbie Court, and Sue Lane. The work for this project is currently underway and should be completed by the end of August.

7) The Union Road and Salem Bend Curb Replacement is a precursor to the 2023 resurfacing project on the same roads. The deteriorated curb on both of these streets was completely replaced in late spring in anticipation of the road resurfacing next year. ☀️

Training to Better Serve the Community

The Clayton, Englewood and Union Fire Department Collaborative's Vision Statement is: "Our organization will set the standard for increased care, response, and education to better serve the community at large." For the departments to ensure they continue providing the best care, response, and service to their community, the entire Collaborative trains all of their basic job functions monthly while also training weekly on various topics broken into emergency medical services (cardiac, strokes, seizures, fall injuries, respiratory emergencies, extremities injuries and pediatric emergencies), firefighting (driving, pumping water, water applications, ladder operations, ventilation, vehicle extrication, search, and rescue), and special operations. Each department member must also pass an annual practical and written exam to ensure they continue to have the knowledge and skills to provide the highest quality of service to the entire community.

In the last two years the Clayton, Englewood and Union Fire Department Collaborative has been training on special operations, which are technical rescue situations the department may encounter in the region. A risk assessment was conducted to determine the most pertinent technical rescue situations the departments were most likely to encounter in the community. The outcome of that assessment listed rope rescue, water rescue, trench rescue, active shooter, and machine rescue as areas of concentration. These rescue disciplines require a significant amount of training and dedication to obtain the required certification as well as recurring training to ensure a maintained high skill level. The Collaborative is proud to now include a significant number of personnel trained to the highest level of all these rescue disciplines.



In the last two years, Collaborative crews have responded to emergency incidents involving rope, water, and machine rescues in our and other communities in southwest Ohio which solidified the importance of this training. The Collaborative also now participates in the Region 3 Rescue Strike Team which provides these rescue services to an 8-County region and the State of Ohio. Joining this team saves the three communities resources by providing the departments with ongoing training and rescue assets housed locally to respond not only regionally, but locally.

In the last two years the Clayton, Englewood and Union Fire Department Collaborative has trained over 28,646 hours in emergency medical services, firefighting, and special operations, which is well beyond what the State of Ohio requires. Training is a key component for the departments to continue providing high-quality service to residents and businesses alike, during their time of need.



New Hires Recognized by City Council

Clayton City Council was proud to welcome new Police Officer Paige Ghrist and Fire Inspector Erin Johnson at the May 19th City Council meeting. Ghrist grew up in Clayton and graduated from Northmont High School prior to becoming a Clark County Deputy Sheriff. Before coming to Clayton in September of 2021, Johnson was part of the Fire Collaborative with the City of Englewood. Welcome aboard Officer Ghrist and Inspector Johnson!

● Staff is currently working with outside consultants on a Housing Inventory Study as well as a Thoroughfare Plan Project, which were both recommended by the PLAN Clayton Implementation Committee in 2021. Both projects have been deemed essential to the future of Clayton ensuring the city's smart growth philosophy continues to be followed. The Housing Inventory Study will identify what the current housing stock offers new and existing residents while also detailing where future opportunities exist. The Thoroughfare Plan Project will assist in identifying what the city's future infrastructure should consider, including road sizes and future walkability opportunities as the city continues to grow. ☀️

Location is Everything

Quick code enforcement reminder! Did you know trash cans must be stored behind the front wall of your home? And vehicles aren't permitted to be parked in the front yard or even on an unpaved surface? These two concerns are the code enforcement program's most called in complaints throughout the year. Proactive enforcement has been instituted to address both of these issues, so please make sure you're storing your trashcans and vehicles in the appropriate location before you get a letter notifying you that you're in violation of city codes and regulations.



Refuse Service & Collection

The City of Clayton contracts its refuse and recycling services to Republic Service. Here are a few reminders about residents' accounts:

- When you move out or move in, please remember to close or open your trash account with Republic Services by calling 937-268-8595.
- Confirm that Republic has your correct phone number and email so they can contact you if there are unexpected collection delays, issues with service, etc.
- Wrap your upholstered items in plastic prior to placing them at the curb for trash pick-up.
- If you are having an issue and it is unresolved by Republic, please contact the Clayton Government Offices at 937-836-3500.
- The fourth quarter of 2019, Republic Services took over billing services. In the City's contract with Republic Service, if a residential unit's payment is delinquent more than three quarters, the City assumes the amount owed and undertakes the collection of the debt owed by the residential unit. Therefore, if you owe for any quarters between 4th quarter 2019 and 3rd quarter 2021, you will receive an invoice from the City of Clayton. ☀️
