CLAYTON IS MONTGOMERY COUNTY'S SAFEST CITY



Clayton once again has been ranked one of the safest cities in Ohio and the safest in Montgomery County. Safewise, an independent review site, ranked Clayton as the 26th safest city in Ohio. Clayton was also the top ranked community in all of Montgomery County. It's 0.38 rate of violent crimes per 1,000 people is better than the state (3.60) and national (4.49) average and it's property crime rate of 8.97 per 1,000 also far exceeds the state's (29.63) and national (27.11) rates. FIRE DEPARTMENT DONATES MEDIC TO PINK RIBBON GIRLS

The City of Clayton continues being a great supporter of the Pink Ribbon Girls and their mission of assisting women and families battling breast and ovarian cancer throughout the Northmont region. Fresh off helping to raise almost \$8,000 last year for the group, the City of Clayton agreed to donate a 2002 medic unit to the non-profit earlier this year. The former medic will be wrapped in the organization's colors and will be visiting various fundraisers across the region later this year.

This donation was made possible with the purchase of a new 2019 Wheeled Coach Medic Unit by the City of Clayton. The new medic is the first in Clayton's fleet to have a load system which loads and unloads patients without paramedics having to bear any weight. This system will drastically improve the safety of the fire department personnel and the community due to the cot being loaded and unloaded through a hands-free system utilizing current power cots already owned by Clayton.

Clayton is excited to continually provide the highest level of life safety to the community at large while also supporting the Pink Ribbon Girls and their great mission!

HELP PREVENT FLOODING

Over the past couple of years, several areas in Clayton have observed heavy flooding during periods of powerful rain storms. With Spring upon us, there are several things the Clayton Service Department suggests that will keep flooding to a minimum during spring rain showers. These tips will also assist in keeping residents and their properties free from potential high-water damage.

1. Clear objects such as leaves, grass, limbs and other debris from curb drains, catch basins, drive pipes and ditches.
2. Do not blow grass into the street when mowing.
3. Never throw yard waste such as limbs or mulch into the ditch or streets.
4. If a catch basin on your property is not working as it should, please have the pipes cleaned so you or your neighbor won't get flooded. Several yard drains in the region have sump pump lines in them but are the responsibility of the home owner to maintain.
5. Driveway pipes and ditch enclosure pipes are the responsibility of the homeowner to maintain. If these get backed up or cluttered with debris, please clean them out ASAP.
6. Creeks and drainage channels on private property are also the responsibility of the homeowner to maintain.
7. Make sure all leaves are picked up after the city crews are done with leaf season. (Typically, December 1st).



BE SAFE WITH SPRING BONFIRES

Spring is a popular time of year to have bonfires. The weather is warmer during the day yet cool at night and there is usually an overabundance of tree limbs in residents' yards needing to be disposed of. The City of Clayton's rules and regulations for open burning are governed by the local Regional Air Pollution Control Agency (RAPCA). All residential requests for open burning are to be made through RAPCA and the required forms can be found at their website, www.rapca.org.

TRASH RATES TO REMAIN THE SAME IN 2019



The City of Clayton is excited to announce city residents will see no increase in their quarterly trash bill this year. After soliciting and reviewing bids from different interested companies, the City of Clayton will enter into a new five-year contract with our current provider, Republic Services, on May 1, 2019. Residents will experience no disruption in services and no rate increases through May 30, 2020 and then a modest 3% increase per year for the life of the agreement. There are a few minor route changes anticipated but those changes will be communicated in the near future. As part of the new agreement Republic will also become responsible for quarterly billing to residents, starting the last quarterly billing cycle of 2019. 

N. MAIN ANIMAL CLINIC SET TO OPEN



As Clayton continues to proactively work with commercial and residential developers on new projects throughout the city landscape, the first new commercial building completed under the new N. Main Overlay regulations will hold its grand opening later this spring. Clayton residents have wondered for months what was going on at the corner of Old Salem Rd. and N. Main Street and they will soon see the finished product and new location of the N. Main Animal Clinic. The new \$1.1 million building will replace the practice's existing building located further south on N. Main Street.

The new building represents a couple of new beginnings for the Clayton community. The almost 5,500 square foot building provides Drs. Beth Weisberger and Nicole Tebbe, as well as the rest of their staff at the clinic, a new space which is triple their former building size. This will allow them to accept more clients, provide additional services and eventually hire additional employees. For Clayton, it represents a glimpse into what the future of N. Main Street will look like; a corridor with small town charm where people can walk from business to business, buildings located closer to the street for greater visibility, and beautifully landscaped lots complimenting public infrastructure improvements. This corridor transformation will take 2-3 decades to be completed, however the N. Main Animal Clinic is a great example of what the future holds for the city and the overall business community, which has observed nearly \$5.5 million of new commercial investment in Clayton over the past 12 months.

Clayton is excited to see the grand opening of the brand-new N. Main Animal Clinic and wish Drs. Weisberger and Tebbe and their entire staff, the best of luck as they continue to grow towards the future.

CPR AND FIRST AID CLASSES OFFERED

The Clayton Fire Department offers First Aid and CPR classes to residents, local businesses and other local organizations throughout the year. These classes follow the American Safety & Health Institute guidelines. Participants who successfully complete the training will receive a certification card which is valid for two years. The First Aid and CPR classes last six hours and costs \$25.⁰⁰ for residents or individuals working at a Clayton business. The cost is \$55.⁰⁰ for non-residents or individuals working at a non-Clayton business. Payment is preferred to be made via the Clayton website or no later than the day before the class at the Clayton Administration building with a credit card, check or cash. No payments will be permitted the day of the class, for any reason.

Starting in May, CPR classes will be held the first Saturday of each month, unless indicated differently on the schedule, at 9 a.m. in the City of Clayton Council Chambers. Businesses can request a private class for their employees by sending an email to Andy Follick at afollick@clayton.oh.us. Class schedule for 2019: May 4th, June 1st, July 13th, August 3rd, September 14th, October 5th, November 2nd, and December 7th.



PROPERTY MAINTENANCE ALWAYS IMPORTANT AFTER WINTER WEATHER

Spring is a good time to walk around your property to ensure it's clear of any property maintenance violations which may have crept up during the cold and snowy winter months. Our code enforcement officer conducts exterior inspections of every neighborhood throughout the year. He works with residents to inform them if there is a violation and what needs to be done to bring the property into compliance. Things such as junk and debris, unlicensed and inoperable vehicles and high grass are common issues with properties. Clayton also offers free "Sweep Clayton Clean" events in May and October each year which residents can use to dispose of brush, yard waste and junk and debris material free of charge. Keeping your home free of peeling paint, clogged gutters and detached downspouts also protects the structural integrity of your home and will limit more significant repair costs down the road.

The benefit of having a proactive code enforcement program is not only establishing the aesthetic appeal for which Clayton is known for, but also ensuring stable and improving property values within our community. Staff also wants to work with property owners to gain compliance, which we received at an 88% rate in 2018. If you receive a letter notifying you a violation is present on your property, please call our office to discuss. We are willing to work with every property owner until compliance is obtained.

2019 INFRASTRUCTURE IMPROVEMENT PROJECTS




Clayton is continuing to improve infrastructure throughout the city. In 2018 the city repaved 60 roads and approximately 11 miles in the last few years. 2019 will bring curb and gutter assessments on Cheri Lynn, Garber, Skylark and Rathurn. Once curb and gutters have been replaced/ repaired, those streets will be repaved. Repavement of Hoke and Wetzel Farm and parts of Wenger and Mintwood roads will be repaved in 2019.

FISCAL TRANSPARENCY

Just a reminder Clayton provides financial information on OhioCheckbook.com. FIRE HYDRANT FLUSHING



Each year, as consistent as the flowers beginning to bloom, the Fire Department begins their annual hydrant flushing program. This is necessary to clean the water mains and to operate and maintain the fire hydrants at optimal levels. Clayton has over 830 fire hydrants that will be inspected and tested during this process. This year's program will run April through June.

During the hydrant flushing, the water in your home may have a rusty appearance. The discoloration is caused by the iron sediment in the water main being disturbed by the flushing. The discoloration doesn't affect the safety of the water. If you notice discoloration, run cold water for several minutes to clear the lines. The water should run clear in a few minutes. Toilets should also be flushed once or twice. If pressure or volume seems low at faucet locations, check your faucet screens for trapped particles.

If you see the Fire Department working on a hydrant, please drive carefully and provide the same courtesies you would any other road construction crew.

Some additional notes: If you see a crew flushing a hydrant on your street, avoid running tap water and using the dishwasher and washing machine until the flushing is complete. If you use the washing machine during this period, rusty pipes can cause rust stains on your laundry. If this occurs, try a commercial rust remover such as Whink or Iron Out. Follow the instructions carefully and the stain will be removed.



DID YOU KNOW?

- ...Only 11 cents of every dollar of your property taxes go to the City of Clayton?
- ...Police and Fire operating budgets total almost \$4.5 million but only 45.6% is funded thru property taxes?
- ...Based on the average Clayton home value, Clayton Fire and Emergency Medical Services cost a resident \$17.50 per month? *(Compare that to your monthly cable and cell service)*
- ...The Clayton Fire Department had an 18% increase in calls for service over the past 5-years and 25% in the last 10-years?
- ...The Clayton Police Department had a 9% increase in calls for service over the past 3-years.
- ... Clayton operates two full-time fire stations and service a community of over 18-square miles with an average response time of under 5-minutes?
- ...There was \$5.4 million in commercial investments last year in Clayton?
- ...Paving a 2-mile stretch of road costs an average of \$350,000?
- ...Clayton spent a little over \$7.1 million in road improvements over the last 3-years?
- ...The fallen leaves were extremely heavy in 2018 and required 76-additional dump truck loads to be collected and hauled away verse 2017?
- ... More than \$184,000 was spent plowing and salting roads during the 2018-2019 winter season.
- ... When mailboxes are damaged during a snow event, typically, they aren't hit by snow plows at all? The damage occurs by heavy snow striking the mailbox during plowing.
- ...Clayton was awarded almost \$500,000 in grants over the past 2-years for community improvement projects, including the Hoke Rd. resurfacing, installing ADA ramps throughout Clayton, and providing more energy efficient utilities at the Meadowbrook at Clayton event facilities? All three projects will be completed in 2019.


