CLAYTON'S NEWEST PLANNER/ZONING ADMINISTRATOR

Clayton was excited to welcome Seth Dorman, the city's newest city planner/zoning administrator, at the beginning of August. Seth, who has over 20 years in both the public and private planning sector after graduating from Wright State University, is already taking the baton left by Jennifer Barclay and working on moving PLAN Clayton's implementation plan forward throughout the city. In addition to reviewing zoning permit applications and staffing both zoning/planning boards, Seth's primary responsibility will be ensuring the vision laid out in the updated comprehensive land use plan is fully realized in strategically planned steps and projects. After realizing several new improvement projects within the park system and continuing to work on the new zoning code, staff is busy working on laying the groundwork for the next 12-18 months' worth of projects to continue moving PLAN Clayton forward. One of the initiatives spearheaded by Seth is the



formation of an Implementation Committee to discuss ideas and programs centered around the PLAN Clayton Implementation Plan. There continues to be a few seats open on this committee for any residents who may be interested in participating in this new endeavor. NEW ZONING CODE CONTINUES MOVING CLAYTON FORWARD

After almost 6 months of delays due to COVID-19, Calfee Zoning presented the first completed working draft of the proposed new zoning code to City Council at the August 6th virtual City Council workshop, which was advertised and open to the public. Since that meeting, the draft has been available online for public review. City Council and the Zoning Code Steering Committee is also reviewing the document and will be providing comments back to staff and Calfee which will be incorporated prior to the document going before the Planning Commission in a public meeting and finally to City Council in another public meeting. The new code will continue to protect the agricultural and rural areas of the city and build upon the small-town charm so many identified as important for the future of Clayton during the PLAN Clayton process. The new code also aims to make development much easier along the commercial corridors in Clayton, place an emphasis on parks and green spaces in new residential areas and assist in redevelopment and infill projects throughout Clayton. The new code is projected to be approved and adopted in early 2021.

SWEEP CLAYTON CLEAN IS STILL ON FOR OCTOBER

Just as Clayton did in the spring, we'll continue to hold the Sweep Clayton Clean event this fall. However, to continue doing our part to limit possible COVID-19 exposure, volunteers will only be available to help direct traffic. There will be no volunteers available to assist in unloading vehicles. Dumpsters will be available until noon or until they are at full capacity, no exceptions. As in past years, City staff will be onsite to chip brush and tree debris.

REMINDERS FROM PUBLIC SAFETY

Sunday, November 1st marks the end to daylight savings time and most people use this as a reminder to change smoke and carbon monoxide detector batteries.

Here are a few other reminders from the public safety departments as the days get shorter and temperatures gets cooler:



9PM Routine. Get in the practice of making sure your home, vehicle and property are secure at night.

Be careful with space heaters. They may be small, but they pack a powerful punch, able to heat one area or room on their own. Make sure there is plenty of space around the heater so it can vent and you don't want it to accidentally set something close to it on fire. Don't leave a space heater unattended.

Candle safety. While candles give off a great aroma and a soft glow, they are definitely fire hazards. Keep them away from flammable materials, light them in a place where kids or pets can't knock them over, and make sure to blow them out before leaving your house or going to sleep. The National Candle Association reports that almost 10,000

home fires per year start with faulty candle use.

Residents can pick up to five locks at the Clayton Government Center during regular business hours.



SALEM AVENUE PROJECTS WILL CONTINUE IN 2021

Clayton's dedication to improving the city's infrastructure has never been more apparent over the past four years and 2021 will see even more work being done on one of the city's main commercial corridors. This year's median, curb and catch basin replacement project along Salem Ave. is now completed and awaits the second phase of the project which is slated to begin in the middle of next year. 2021 will see a safety project undertaken at the Union Rd. and SR 49 intersection, funded by a safety grant from the Ohio Department of Transportation. Clayton's entire section of Salem will also be resurfaced next year by ODOT to coincide with the new concrete work which was completed this year. Following these two projects will be a third safety project at the Westbrook Rd. and SR 49 intersection, again funded by a safety grant through ODOT. Staff is also currently working on new signage and branding initiatives to compliment the newly improved corridor. The new signage and branding will be consistent with benchmarks called out in the PLAN Clayton document and is seen as the first step of a city-wide initiative over the next several years.

RESIDENTIAL LEAF PICK-UP PROGRAM

It's that time of year again when the leaves begin to fall, and yards transition from the bright colors of summer to beautiful hues of autumn. To help residents remove fallen leaves, Clayton will continue offering two scheduled pickups starting in October through the end of November. Crews will also make additional tours through neighborhoods during the leaf pickup program and one time afterwards to ensure all the leaves taken out to the road during the program are removed prior to the snow removal season.

As always, this service is weather dependent. Fall rain and early snow falls will alter the schedule of leaf pickup, however the crews will be in every neighborhood multiple times throughout the leaf pickup season. To assist in making the leaf collection process run as smoothly as possible residents are asked to remember the following tips:

- Place only leaves in the leaf piles. Other forms of yard waste such as rocks, pieces of cement, tree branches, twigs, flowers, walnuts, and grass clippings slow the collection process and damage City equipment.
- Have leaves in place on the Sunday preceding the scheduled week of your zone collection.
- If there are leaves left after the pickup, it is because crews could not reach them with the equipment. Residents will need to move them closer to the street and they'll be picked up on the next pass.
- Residents may place leaves and yard waste at the curb in standard plastic bags for normal trash pickup at any time.



Leaf piles should be placed as close to the curb as possible (without obstructing traffic). City vehicles will not leave the paved area. If we can't reach the leaves we can't pick them up.



Leaves should not be piled behind parked vehicles, near storm drains, or around telephone poles, sign posts, or mailboxes.



Property owners without curbs may pile their leaves as close to the street as possible, but should never be placed in the street.

CITY RECEIVES 180K IN CARES ACT FUNDS

In July 2020, the City received its portion of the CARES Act funds. The funds were distributed from the state to the county which was then allocated to each municipality. Prior to receiving the funds, City Council passed a resolution that affirmed proper expenditure of the monies. The strict guidelines for usage of the funds was developed at the federal and state levels. Funds must be committed by October 2020, otherwise they must be returned to the county for redistribution. Funds allocated to the City of Clayton are being used to reimburse the City for costs related to COVID-19 and include purchase of personal protective equipment and technology for remote meeting and work capabilities. Although these funds cannot replace lost revenue for the City, it does help bridge the gap from the unexpected expenses.

OLD VILLAGE COMES TOGETHER

Community pride is something residents all over Clayton take seriously on a daily basis. Examples are observed frequently throughout the community in the forms of donations, neighbors helping one another, people working on beautifying the neighborhoods and hosts of other initiatives. The neighbors in the Old Village of Clayton have been working together on several community projects the past couple of years which demonstrates such pride.

The group of neighbors in the Old Village originally partnered with the city to begin rehabbing the old gazebo at the corner of Talmadge and Salem Street. In addition to bringing the gazebo back to life with fresh paint, roof repairs, new electrical outlets and landscaping they were able to create a new gathering place for holidays, seen through their recent Halloween and Christmas neighborhood events. This year, the group reached out to their fellow neighbors proposing hanging American flags on their homes as a sign of unity and community pride during the Memorial Day holiday. After additional neighborhood efforts, 80 of the 109 homes were proudly flying flags during the Memorial Day weekend, 44 of those flag sets being purchased through donated resources from the community at large. Recently, the group has initiated phase I of the Old Clayton Cemetery Restoration Project. The group is presently working with the Randolph Historical Society and the city on updating the tombstone inventory and plan on then working with a gravestone restorer to clean the headstones throughout the cemetery.

Thank you to all the neighbors who worked together on all of these projects and helped demonstrate what Clayton pride is all about.

CENSUS 2020

If you haven't had an opportunity to respond to the Census 2020 questionnaire, please do so soon! Census workers are also currently going door-to-door to help residents respond who haven't been able to. Make sure anyone who claims to be from the Census Bureau has an ID badge with their photo, a U.S. Department of Commerce watermark, and an expiration date. Census workers may also carry Census Bureau bags and other equipment with the Census Bureau logo.

The census count is greatly important to all communities because it assists in determining where billions of federal dollars are allocated annually. These resources help fund critical community programming such as road improvements, schools, emergency responders and much more. Many grant programs which have assisted Clayton over the years to accomplish several

community projects are directly based on the results of the census. The census is also imperative to continued economic development as the business community look to data generated from the survey results to determine which communities to invest in. It only takes a few minutes to complete and the results will have a large impact on funding assistance for Clayton for the next 10 years. At the end of August, Clayton was 10 percentage points above the state average of reporting residents, at almost 79% self-reporting. NEW FIRE COLLABORATION WITH SURROUNDING CITIES MOVE NORTHMONT FORWARD



In the beginning of June, the cities of Clayton, Englewood and Union announced a unique and forward-thinking collaborative improving emergency services through an innovative cooperative partnership which will move fire and EMS services forward in the majority of the Northmont community. While every department will continue to maintain their departmental independence, this initiative will see a highly coordinated effort between all three departments, ensuring the closest and most appropriate response to an emergency scenario regardless of city boundaries. Many factors led to the formation of the collaboration including staffing shortages, future capital expenditures, training and supervision. A comprehensive

MOU was approved by all three cities addressing the staffing shortages, improved response times, more effective use of supervisory personnel, coordinated training opportunities and improved emergency radio communications. This new partnership will also potentially reduce capital expenditures by a combined \$5.2 million over the next 15 years. This new agreement is another example of the Northmont community leading the Montgomery County region with unique and outside the box thinking while delivering exemplary services with reduced costs to our taxpayers.
